End of recruitment


The 28th March 2024 marked the last day of the PANORAMIC trial's recruitment. Within the space of 2 years and 3 months, **72 sites helped us recruit 29,300 participants** who generously volunteered to help find effective and safe antiviral treatments to reduce hospitalisations and increase recovery speed for those with COVID-19 at home.

The trial could not have been achieved without the **dedicated support of all our sites**, collaborators and partners at the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR), health boards at Wales, Northern Ireland, and Scotland, the hundreds of colleagues across several UK universities, NHS UK-wide, and **thousands of those who supported with the delivery of the trial** within the NIHR Clinical Research Network, GP practices, NHS 111, Test and Trace, and CMDUs.

What are some of the trial's main achievements?

- Two antiviral treatments were studied - molnupiravir and Paxlovid.
- **Three papers** have been published, with more to come!
- The work underpinning the trial's diversity and inclusivity recruitment led to the establishment of the **Centre for Research Equity**.
- The decentralised approach to **academic clinical trial unit medication** dispensing was tried, tested and proven to be feasible.

The Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences (NDPCHS) Clinical Trials Unit (CTU) held the PRINCIPLE-PANORAMIC Celebratory Symposium at Trinity College on 15th April. The day included a range of presentations from CTU staff and collaborators, two interactive sessions, a panel Q&A and a keynote speech from Professor Sir Jonathan Van-Tam, former Deputy Chief Medical Officer for England.
